From the Pastor's Desk

The Eucharist IS Christ really present Body and Blood, together with His Soul and Divinity under the appearance of bread and wine. At Christ's words of consecration offered through the priest, the bread and wine become substantially the Body and Blood of



Christ. The Catechism of the Church Catholic reiterates in paragraph 1376 that change substance is called transubstantiation.

After the

consecration, the bread changes into Christ's risen Body and the wine changes into Christ's Blood but the appearance of bread and wine remain. Although a person's senses perceive only bread and wine, the Council of Trent (1560) declared that it is "the whole Christ," Who "is truly and substantially" present on the altar. This reality is called the Real Presence of Christ. Eucharistic miracles throughout the centuries have supernaturally manifested Christ's sacred humanity in the Eucharist and are still occurring today.

The Eucharist is one of the seven sacraments but is also called the Blessed Sacrament because it not only imparts the grace of Christ but is itself, Christ. The Eucharist is called the Holy Sacrifice of the Altar, for Christ as high priest offers Himself as the Eucharistic Victim to the Eternal Father in atonement for sin. He does this through the ordained priesthood, who act in what's called "in persona Christi" (in the person of Christ.)

The Eucharist is also called Holy Communion because both priests and laity receive Christ and are united to Him in this manner. The Eucharist is, furthermore, reserved in the tabernacle after Mass, whereby Christ allows Himself to be adored by the faithful. The term Eucharist comes from the word eucharistia meaning to give thanks, which is what Christ did at the Last Supper.

Some thoughts on the Gospel: As we learn at the beginning of today's Gospel reading, Jesus



preaches the Kingdom of God in continuity with the preaching of John the Baptist. Like John the Baptist, Jesus' pronouncement of the kingdom is a call to

repentance. Yet Jesus' preaching is greater than John's. Jesus begins the time of fulfillment; the Kingdom of God is already here. This will be demonstrated again and again, both in Jesus' words and in the actions that follow. Jesus' healings and forgiveness of sins are signs of the Kingdom of God that he announces in his teaching. Jesus first called four fishermen— Simon, Andrew, James, and John. Simon and Andrew are brothers. Jesus promises that he will make them "fishers of men." James and John are also brothers. Mark does not report Jesus' words of invitation to them, but he does report that they left their fishing immediately; their father, Zebedee, was left behind in the boat. Mark's Gospel is told with a great sense of urgency and immediacy. Jesus is a person of action, and events occur in rapid succession. We see this in today's Gospel. Time is of the essence; the fishermen immediately put aside their livelihood to become Jesus' disciples. The Kingdom of God is here and now. The time of fulfillment is at hand. How might our lives be different if we more fully shared this sense of the immediacy of God's kingdom?

Mass for the Intentions of the Unborn: On Friday, January 29th at 8:00AM, Holy Mass will be celebrated for the intentions of the unborn. Since the March for Life is virtual this year, we will gather as the faithful to give thanks to God for the precious gift of Life and offer prayers and supplications that innocent human life, especially in the womb, will be served and protected.
