From the Pastor's Desk

We've become a time-driven world. Even families today are driven by personal planners and



computers palm ready to schedule every minute of the day. We allot specific hours to family dinners. recreation. even "quality time" with our children. In fact, our scheduling mania makes it hard for us to cope with unexpected events. We want to avoid the messiness of an unstructured future.

Jesus, however, has other ideas. He asks us to be prepared for His return, no matter when He arrives, day or night, early or late. How awkward that is for us today. It just doesn't fit our lifestyle - and that's precisely the point. Our expectation, anticipation of Jesus' return should pull us out of everyday concerns, moving our eyes off the day's schedule and onto Him. He wants to be the miraculous event that catches us by surprise, unbidden yet hoped for, unplanned but welcome. May today's reading remind us to prepare our hearts and lives for His return, today and every day!

A Summer Reminder: A sense of decorum in dressing for Church: The summertime can be hot and humid and often calls for more comfortable clothing. There is, however, a proper decorum to



be used when considering the clothing we wear to Mass and church. While fancy Sunday-best dresses/hats or suit and tie

may not be the attire we wear in the "causal" atmosphere of today's society, there is always a need to monitor closely what we wear because it reflects on us, our values, and the importance we place on our respect for God and our neighbor. We have no church dress codes we can look to except the one dictated by the virtue of modesty, respect, and good taste. In general, we should avoid the following when dressing for church: Spaghetti straps/tank tops, bare backs or shoulders. sleeveless shirts plunging or

necklines, tubes, skimpy skirts or shorts, low waist pants, Jersey shorts/gym wear, caps or flip*flops.* Thank you for your consideration!

CCD Registrations: Parents are reminded to reregister your children in our CCD program by July 10th so adequate materials can be ordered. Registration forms are available on the bulletin board in the narthex. There are also new registration forms available if your child is just beginning our program.

Eucharistic Reflection: At the moment of reception of Holy Communion, we receive the very person of Jesus Christ, Who is truly, really, and substantially present in the Most Holy Eucharist. To receive Him worthily, it is necessary to be free from mortal sin and to have kept the fast for at least one hour before receiving. You are not required to go to confession



before each Communion, but only when you are conscience of grievous sin. If you doubt you have committed a mortal sin, you may still go to communion after making an Act of

Contrition. Venial sins do not and should not prevent you from going to Holy Communion. However, the purer our conscience, the more graces we receive from the sacrament; so, we should make an Act of Contrition before each communion. Present in our hearts should be the strong desire to be united to Jesus, and arouse within ourselves sentiments of faith, hope, and charity. Let us also not fail to thank Jesus for coming into our hearts after receiving Him and stay conscious of being transformed by Him in mind and spirit. As we are sent from Mass, our mission is to bring Christ to our world!

Jesus, present in the sacrament of your love, I adore you!
